Hello all,

Last week, I returned to campus from my three week “academic retreat” at Notre Dame to find a very animated Mr. Schneider extolling the virtues *The Anxious Generation*, the book we will be reading this year in Duchesne Reads. He stressed, “every parent **needs** to read this book!” And Mr. Schneider is not alone. Jonathan Haidt’s study of Gen Z is stirring up a good deal of conversation around the country. With the rest of my letter, I’ll reintroduce the book in the hopes of encouraging many of you to join us on August 27th at 6:30 for our first meeting. This year, **Duchesne Reads** will be discussing [The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness](#). I came across Haidt’s book while compiling my personal reading list for the summer. Haidt argues that generations are not defined by years or decades, but by significant changes to the culture. The change that shapes people born after 1995, according to Haidt, is the advent of the smart phone, especially those phones defined by fast internet connectivity and a front-facing camera.

In his introduction Haidt writes, “Gen Z became the first generation in history to go through puberty with a portal in their pockets that called them away from the people nearby and into an alternative universe that was exciting, addictive, unstable, and unsuitable for children and adolescents. Succeeding socially in that universe required them to devote a large part of their consciousness—perpetually—to managing what became their online brand.” He then goes on to discuss the flip side of living in a virtual world, “They spent far less time playing with, talking to, touching, or even making eye contact with their friends and families, thereby reducing their participation in embodied social behaviors that are essential for successful human development.”

I know that sounds bleak, but Haidt also offers up simple and interesting solutions. These solutions, however, require collective action on the part of families, schools, and communities. It is my hope that we could get together as a community to discuss Haidt’s ideas and solutions, and see what might work for Duchesne. The first meeting of **Duchesne Reads** will be on August 27th at 6:30. At that time, I’d like to discuss the introduction and the first 4 chapters. I hope you’ll join us.
